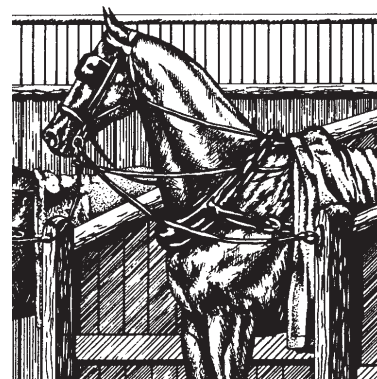

Austria's Home Team Sweeps the Title at 2005 FEI World Driving Championship Pairs; U.S. Team Places Seventh

Lexington, KY – After the excitement of being in the Bronze Medal position after the dressage phase in the three-phased 2005 FEI World Driving Championship Pairs in Wals-Siezenheim, Austria, fate turned the other way for a moment, leaving the U.S. Driving Team to finish seventh out of 18 teams competing. Combining penalty scores from the dressage, cones and marathon phases, Austria's home team was destined to win, with a final score of 248.58.

"We put on a really good show," said Lisa Singer, who at 11th place, was the highest-ranked American individually. "We were really working together. I think we're really strong and I think we can be even stronger in the future."

Normally used to competing against a smaller field, our U.S. Drivers went up against 78 competitors from across the world this time around, presenting a slew

of new challenges and a wealth of experienced opponents.

"This was my first competition of this caliber," shared Alan Aulson excitedly. "It was stupendous, and the level—you're dealing with the best of the best. It was a tremendous learning experience and a challenge at the same time. Overall, I'm very happy." Now, Alan says he's looking forward to the "homework" he'll be taking with him as he gets ready for next year.

"Our drivers have been in Europe training and competing for most of the summer," concluded Wendy Wares-Cooke, USEF director of high performance driving. "They have given it their all and now they're ready to go home and give their horses a well-deserved rest!"

The Squeaky Wheel

The question in life that has recently interested me is that of PARTICIPATION in events and activities that are going on around us and that affect our lives in myriad ways. Often we feel, and probably correctly so, that we can have little effect on the larger issues surrounding us, but in our world of horses and carriage driving we can, in fact, have a great influence on what is going on, especially the competitors among us. However, the recreational drivers who believe that the ADS has little to offer them, are mistaken, as I shall illustrate at the end of this little diatribe.

We are a group, 3,000 strong, that ostensibly are united in our interest in driving, in its many permutations. To this end we came together in 1974, wrote bylaws to guide us, created rules and regulations to govern our competitions, and organized meetings so that we could implement our desires.

Recently, a little committee that I was part of was assigned to review the bylaws that guide us in order that the ADS be in compliance with our incorporation statutes and that we are doing things in the manner that the membership has agreed it wants. We discovered that since none of us - the members - has been paying attention for over 20 years, that our bylaws were

irregular, therefore our meetings, rules, elections, not binding, and that had we been a business, we would have been in deep trouble. In our consternation, as we began to suspect how out of order we were, when we completed our revisions, now in compliance at last, we could only ask and hope that they would be passed, then amended, if necessary, and we could get on with the real business of the ADS - supporting driving. The new proposals were sent out for comment and also with the plea to come and vote on them. We heard back from fewer than 10 people, all but one, members of the Board of Directors, out of three thousand! I am aware that in some quarters there is the perception that a few people, the Board, make all the decisions to suit themselves and that they don't care about anyone else. Well, yes. Because we don't hear anything from anyone very often. When we do, we actually respond and usually follow through. With our new bylaws, which I hope have been accepted by the time you read this, we have democratized the committees and the Nominating Committee and thereby, we hope, the entire ADS. But, if you guys don't come to the meetings or send in your proxies or your comments, then it will continue to be a Society managed by the few. I know it's

expensive to attend twice a year, but occasionally might be possible, but at the very least, you should make your voice heard, which brings me to the recreational aspect of driving.

In the next issue of the WHIP you will probably be hearing about the Right to Ride (and Drive). This is a national piece of legislation which is being proposed to keep lands that have been traditionally equestrian, kept open to horses. This should not be allowed to be regarded as purely a Western movement. It must include the many publicly owned lands in the East and elsewhere. Among many places that are in peril of being lost to equestrian access, Acadia National Park in Maine, with its spectacular carriage roads is ever on the brink of possible restrictions. All of us who drive for pleasure, and that is, all of us, need, rely on and love the chance to drive "forever". The ADS along with other horse associations, must back this legislation. We will need your support to do so.

Please, when these matters which affect us all in different ways, come up - PARTICIPATE in any way you can. Actually, it is so rewarding to do so, that it gives those who do, and abiding feeling of satisfaction. Join us!

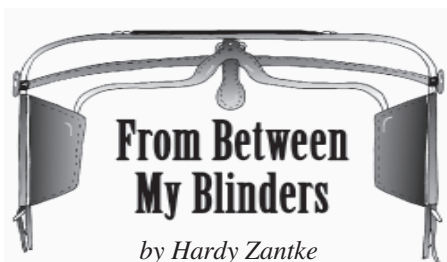

With today's quick communication and many reports and results on the Internet, I think most of you are probably already well informed on the outcome of the Pairs World Championship in Austria. So I will not go into those details but just give you a quick glance from my perspective:

As also in Catton Hall we started out very well during the dressage phase, being in first place as a Nation on the evening of day one with Lisa Singer and Fritz Grupe both having quite good dressage tests. On day two however some of the other Nations had their best drivers, but we still held on to a good third place at the end of dressage out of 18 Nations.

I believe it shows that our training programs are on the right track. The marathon as well as cones presented all of our drivers with some unusual slight hick-ups, contrary to their good form which they had shown in previous

competitions here as well as in Europe. So the outcome fell a bit below our high expectations, yet was still very acceptable and the drivers showed improvements over previous years, with the marathon seeing Lisa finishing 19th out of 76 compared to 33 out of 64 two years ago in France, and Mike McLennan finishing 26th compared to 40 before. Lisa Singer and Fritz Grupe could not give their so often double clean cones drive either, yet we still finished one place better as Nation than two years ago, and Lisa Singer improved to 11 place overall compared to 16 in Jardy, and Mike McLennan to 28 compared to 43 in Jardy. So I believe we are on the right track.

In general we had a similar experience as at Catton Hall (except unfortunately no individual Medal this time) that we start out strong in dressage - which is great - but then become softer on the marathon and in the cones. Once again, I believe that only competing even more in Europe under the large fields of top competitors can improve our drivers' performance further at World Championships.

The team worked very much in harmony with each other and the great contribution of the Grupes and Aulsons hiring an excellent full time catering service for the entire Camp USA did much in that respect.

The team was in very good spirit and all cooperated well with each other throughout the competition.

Our policy of involving knowledgeable team supporters from among the American spectators paid off too. We had again organized volunteers to video tape each of our drivers in each obstacle. Very fortunately Team Coach Chester Weber had our evidence in support of Mike McLennan ready within minutes when we learned that McLennan was eliminated for missing a gate in an obstacle. Without the clear video tape in our favor we probably would not have had much of a chance against the stern eyewitness report of one of the Members of the Ground Jury. Our thanks go to Mary Mott-Kocsis for videotaping. This only shows once again, that we all are human and make mistakes: Even Judges at World Championships! I am glad the President of the Ground Jury was open minded and willing to accept our video tape as evidence.

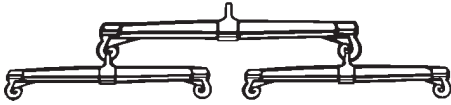

Question: How can I best get my horse accustomed to going up hills?

Answer: Charles Kellogg, in his book *Driving the Horse In Harness* (sadly no longer in print), has this to say: "Hills can be a problem. The weight of a carriage going downhill against the breeching is something a driving horse must learn to handle - again, experience in quiet surroundings a little at a time is the best way to train him. Newly driven horses often view an approaching hill or upgrade with misgivings; some will attempt to gallop or charge up the hill, some will go only so far, then stop in fear of the pressure on their shoulders. Providing the way is clear there is no

harm in letting the young horse canter a little beginning an upgrade; he needs the confidence that will grow as he masters the grade. Once he gains that, he probably will cease to charge hills all by himself; if not, he can be checked by his driver. The horse that quits half way up the hill is more of a problem. He has to be reassured. Generally he can be 'restarted' by leading him with encouragement: he may scramble and plunge a bit, which is all right if he keeps going. Gradual and short slopes are the answer for him - over a period of time he'll find out he can do it. *Please* - no beating with the whip! That will just upset him more and he will associate the pain with the hill, making things even worse. This is a situation where there is no blueprint beyond just working with the horse to build up his ability, his confidence and his obedience."

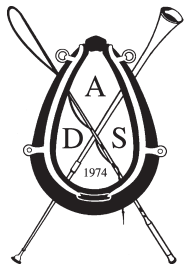
